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1.0 Executive Summary

Matrix Heritage, on behalf of R. W. Tomlinson (Tomlinson), the property owner and proposed licensee, undertook a Stage 3 archaeological assessment of the J. McAvoy site (BfFv-21) located on part Lot 14, Concession 8, in the Geographic Township of Oxford in the United Counties of Leeds and Grenville, Ontario (Map 1, SD Map 1). The property was subject to previous Stage 1 and 2 archaeological assessments in 2022 and 2023 (Matrix Heritage 2022; Matrix Heritage 2024) which were in support of a proposed aggregate resource license application process required as per the *Aggregate Resources Act* (ARA) (Map 2, SD Map 2). The objectives of the Stage 3 assessment were to determine the cultural heritage value of the J. McAvoy Site (BfFv-21), previously identified by Matrix Heritage (2024). This assessment is in accordance with the Ministry of Citizenship and Multiculturalism's (MCM) *Standards and Guidelines for Consultant Archaeologists*.

The Stage 1 background assessment concluded that, based on criteria outlined in the MCM's *Standards and Guidelines for Consultant Archaeologists* (Section 1.3, 2011), the study area had both pre-contact Indigenous as well as historical Euro-Canadian archaeological potential (Matrix Heritage 2022).

The Stage 2 archaeological assessment involved both subsurface testing consisting of hand excavated test pits at 5 metre intervals, and a pedestrian survey at 5 m intervals as per Standard 2., Section 2.1.2. (MCM 2011) in areas of archaeological potential. During the Stage 2 field assessment an artifact scatter was identified in the northeast corner of the study area through 12 positive test pits on the 5 m grid as well as intensification test pits which produced a total of 166 artifacts representing a mid 19th century domestic occupation (Map 3, SD Map 1 and 3). It was concluded that these finds likely represent the historic occupation of the property by the McAvoy family. The Stage 2 Archaeological Assessment found the site to have a sufficient level of Cultural Heritage Value or Interest (CHVI) and recommended Stage 3 archaeological assessment to further understand the occupational content, extent, and the composition of the identified artifact scatter (Matrix Heritage 2023).

As per the Stage 2 recommendations for the J. McAvoy Site (BfFv-21), in keeping with Section 3.2.2 and Table 3.1 of the *Standards and Guidelines for Consulting Archaeologists* and Section 3 of the *Archaeology of Rural Historical Farmsteads* (MCM 2014), as it appeared from the Stage 2 results that the site would proceed to Stage 4, the Stage 3 grid was laid out in the form of 1x1 m excavation units on a 10 m grid with infill units numbering 40% of the unit total as per Points 3 and 4 in Table 3.1, Section 3.2.2 (MCM 2011).

During Stage 3 excavations, skeletal material was encountered and initially determined to be foetal human remains. Following police notification, attendance at the scene, clearance of concerns regarding foul play, a Burial Site Investigation (BSI) order was issued by the Registrar, *Funeral, Burial and Cremation Services Act*, 2002 (herein referred to as the Registrar). Accordingly, a BSI was initiated under Stage 3 PIF number P369-0412-2023. Subsequently, as the BSI investigations progressed, it was determined that the initial skeletal material uncovered was not human remains, but rather those of a foetal pig which were associated with other small animal burials uncovered during the BSI including a cat and three other foetal pigs. The determination as foetal pig was definitive as the articulated skeleton was uncovered, including the tail. The BSI order was rescinded by the Registrar, and the investigation results and artifacts collected are combined herein.

In total, the Stage 3 assessment of the J. McAvoy Site (BfFv-21) covered the Stage 2 artifact scatter and consisted of the excavation of a total of 57 1x1 m units. The initial Stage 3 included 16 units on the 10 m grid with 7 off-grid infill units consisting of 44% of the grid total placed to investigate artifact concentrations, drop-offs, and other features. The falsely triggered BSI resulted in 34 units concentrated on the find location for the skeletal remains and on a checkerboard pattern as the start of completing a 5 m clearance buffer around the initial skeletal find as requested by the Registrar (Map 3, SD Map 3). The overall Stage 3 assessment produced a total of 6,052 artifacts.

Field work was carried out over 10 days between September 12 to October 4, 2023. Weather conditions were mainly overcast with temperatures around 20° Celsius. Permission to access the property was provided by Tomlinson without limitations.

The archaeological evidence uncovered represents an occupation of the J. McAvoy site during the mid 19th century. This correlates with the documentary evidence of the property being occupied by the McAvoy family from 1855-1867. Therefore, the site has Cultural Historic Value or Interest (CHVI) under Section 3.4.2, Standards 1. a. and b., as most (80% or more) of the archaeologically documented occupation of the property predates 1870 (MCM 2011). Other criteria outlined in Table 3.2 of the Standards and Guidelines (MCM 2011) are relevant to the J. McAvoy site, namely the integrity of the site and the first generation of settlement.

In discussion with the licensee and property owner, it was determined that the J. McAvoy Site (BfFv-21) can be avoided and protected within the current development plan and is therefore recommended for Stage 4 Mitigation of Development Impact through long term protection and avoidance as per Section 4.1.4 (MCM 2011).

The J. McAvoy Site (BfFv-21) site will be avoided and protected during planned aggregate activities and long-term through the formal Site Plan under the ARA (SD Map 2). The following recommendations are made based on Stage 1 background research, Stage 2 test pit survey, Stage 3 test excavations:

1. The J. McAvoy Site (BfFv-21) archaeological site (Map 1, SD Map 1) is recommended to be of further CHVI and will be subject to long term protection and avoidance through the formal Site Plan registration under the ARA (SD Map 2).
2. The J. McAvoy Site (BfFv-21) and a 10-metre protective buffer zone shall be formally included as a protected area on the Site Plan under the ARA to prevent future encroachment (SD Map 2).
3. Routine agricultural use of the land may continue at existing levels, including the same practices and crop types, with the following restrictions:
 - a. No new drainage tiles, deep ploughing, or other invasive improvements.
 - b. No tree planting or crops requiring deep-rooted systems.
 - c. No irrigation systems requiring trenching or excavation.
4. The ARA Site Plan must explicitly prohibit all other disturbance to the J. McAvoy Site and the buffer, including:
 - a. No stockpiling of overburden.
 - b. No heavy equipment operation.
 - c. No ground disturbance including but not limited to landscaping, planting, grading, or soil stripping.
5. To ensure that the J. McAvoy Site (BfFv-21) is protected and not altered, the following shall be implemented:

- a. Prior to grading or other soil-disturbing activities extending to the limits of the protected area, excluding routine agricultural use, erect a barrier (i.e., fence) around the 10 m protective buffer zone.
 - b. Issue “no-go” instructions to all on-site construction crews, engineers, architects, or others involved in day-to-day decisions during construction.
 - c. Show the location of the area to be avoided on all Site Plans, when applicable. Include explicit instructions or labelling to avoid that area.
 - d. A letter is provided by the proponent stating they are aware of the presence of the archaeological site within the limits of the ARA licence and that they are aware of the restrictions on alteration of an archaeological site of further CHVI as per the condition on their ARA licence as per Section 48 of the Ontario Heritage Act.
 - e. The protected archaeological site and its associated 10-metre buffer shall be clearly identified and incorporated into the final rehabilitation section of the Site Plan under the ARA. The rehabilitation plan must designate the archaeological site as excluded from any future disturbance or land alteration and ensure its long-term protection in accordance with its status as a site of further CHVI.
6. A licensed archaeologist must be present to monitor grading or other soil-disturbing activities extending to the limits of the protective buffer to ensure the J. McAvoy Site (BfFv-21) and its protective area are not altered in any way. Routine agricultural operations within permitted use parameters do not require archaeological monitoring.
7. Despite the rigorous nature of archaeological assessments, there remains a possibility that some cultural material may not have been identified. If any artifacts of Indigenous interest or human remains are encountered anywhere within the subject property, including the J. McAvoy Site (BfFv-21) and its protective buffer, all work must cease immediately, and the appropriate authorities must be contacted including:

4.0 Project Context

4.1 Development Context

Matrix Heritage, on behalf of R. W. Tomlinson (Tomlinson), undertook a Stage 3 archaeological assessment of the J. McAvoy Site (BfFv-21) located on part Lot 14, Concession 8, in the Geographic Township of Oxford in the United Counties of Leeds and Grenville, Ontario (Map 1, SD Map 1). The property was subject to previous Stage 1 and 2 archaeological assessments in 2022 and 2023 (Matrix Heritage 2022; Matrix Heritage 2023) which were in support of a proposed aggregate resource license application process required as per the *Aggregate Resources Act* (Map 2). The objective of this Stage 3 assessment investigation was to assess the cultural heritage value of the J. McAvoy Site (BfFv-21), identified during the Stage 2 assessment. This assessment is in accordance with the Ministry of Citizenship and Multiculturalism's (MCM) *Standards and Guidelines for Consultant Archaeologists*.

Previous Stage 1 and 2 investigations (Matrix Heritage 2022; Matrix Heritage 2023) recommended a Stage 3 archaeological assessment relating to a scatter of 166 mid to late 19th century artifacts identified in the northeastern corner of the property during the Stage 2 test pit survey (SD Map 1). At the time of the Stage 3 archaeological assessment, the study area was owned by Tomlinson. Permission to access the study property was granted by the owner prior to the commencement of any field work; no limits were placed on this access.

During Stage 3 excavations, skeletal material was encountered and initially determined to be foetal human remains. Following police notification, attendance at the scene, clearance of concerns regarding foul play, a Burial Site Investigation (BSI) order (see Supplementary Documentation) was issued by the Registrar, *Funeral, Burial and Cremation Services Act, 2002* (herein referred to as the Registrar). Accordingly, a BSI was initiated under Stage 3 PIF number P369-0412-2023. Subsequently, as the BSI investigations progressed, it was determined that the initial skeletal material uncovered was not human remains, but rather those of a foetal pig which were associated with other small animal burials uncovered during the BSI including a cat and three other foetal pigs. The determination as foetal pig was definitive as the articulated skeleton was uncovered, including the tail. The BSI order was rescinded by the Registrar, the associated PIF was cancelled, and the investigation results and artifacts collected are combined herein.

4.2 Historical Context

4.2.1 Historic Documentation

Notable histories of the Algonquins include: *Algonquin Traditional Culture* (Whiteduck 1995) and *Executive Summary: Algonquins of Golden Lake Claim* (Holmes and Associates 1993a).

The subject property is located east of Kemptville Creek, in the Geographic Township of Oxford, currently the Municipality of North Grenville, United Counties of Leeds and Grenville, Ontario. There are a few publications of the early history of the county and township. Notable references include; *Historical Review of Kemptville and District* (Kemptville Centennial Committee 1957); *Kemptville Past and Present* (Kemptville & District Historical Society 1991); *Leeds and Grenville: Their First 200 Years* (McKenzie 1967); and a useful historical resource *History of Leeds and Grenville Ontario from 1749-1879* (Leavitt 1879).

4.2.2 Pre-Contact Period

Archaeological information suggests that ancestral Anishinabe Algonquin people lived in the region for at least 8,000 years before the Europeans arrived in North America. This traditional territory is generally considered to encompass the Ottawa Valley on both sides of the river, in Ontario and Quebec, from the Rideau Lakes to the headwaters of the Ottawa River. The region is dominated by the Canadian Shield which is characterized by low rolling land of Boreal Forest, rock outcrops and muskeg with innumerable lakes, ponds, and rivers. This environment dictated much of the traditional culture and lifestyle of the Anishinabe Algonquin peoples. At the time of European contact, the Anishinabe Algonquin territory was bounded on the east by the Montagnais people, to the west by the Nipissing and Ojibwa, to the north by the Cree, and to the south by the lands of the Iroquois.

Naming

The Anishinabe Algonquin name for themselves is Anishinabeg, which means "human being." The word Algonquin supposedly came from the Malecite word meaning "they are our relatives", which French explorer Samuel de Champlain recorded as "Algooumequin" in 1603. The name stuck and the term "Algonquin" refers to those groups that have their traditional lands around the Ottawa Valley. Some confusion can arise regarding the term "Algonquian" which refers to the broader language family, of which the dialect of the Algonquin is one. The Algonquian linguistic group stretches across a significant part of North America and comprises scores of Nations related by language and customs.

Early Human Occupation

The earliest human occupation of the Americas has been documented to predate 14,000 years ago, however at this time much of eastern Canada was covered by thick and expansive glaciers. The Laurentide Ice Sheet of the Wisconsinian glacier blanketed the Ottawa area until about 11,000 B.P. when then the glacial terminus receded north of the Ottawa Valley, and water from the Atlantic Ocean flooded the region to create the Champlain Sea. This sea encompassed the lowlands of Quebec on the north shore of the Ottawa River and most of Ontario east of Petawawa, including the Ottawa Valley and Rideau Lakes. By 10,000 B.P. the Champlain Sea was receding and within 1,000 years has drained from Eastern Ontario (Watson 1990:9).

The northern regions of eastern Canada were still under sheets of glacial ice as small groups of hunters moved into the southern areas following the receding ice and water. By circa 11,000 B.P., when the Ottawa area was emerging from glaciations and being flooded by the Champlain Sea, northeastern North America was home to what are commonly referred to as the Paleo people. For Ontario the Paleo period is divided into the Early Paleo period (11,000 - 10,400 B.P.) and the Late Paleo period (10,500-9,400 B.P.), based on changes in tool technology (Ellis and Deller 1990). The Paleo people, who had moved into hospitable areas of southwest Ontario, likely consisted of small groups of exogamous hunter-gatherers relying on a variety of plants and animals who ranged over large territories (Jamieson 1999). The few possible Paleo period artifacts found, as surface finds or poorly documented finds, in the broader Eastern Ontario region are from the Rideau Lakes area (Watson 1990) and Thompson's Island near Cornwall (Ritchie 1969:18). In comparison, little evidence exists for Paleo occupations in the immediate Ottawa Valley, as can be expected given the environmental changes the region underwent, and the recent exposure of the area from glaciations and sea. As Watson suggests (Watson 1999:38), it is possible Paleo people followed the changing shoreline of the Champlain Sea,

moving into the Ottawa Valley in the late Paleo Period, although archaeological evidence is absent.

Archaic Period

As the climate continued to warm, the glacial ice sheet receded further northwards allowing areas of Eastern Ontario to be travelled and occupied in what is known as the Archaic Period (9,500 – 2,900 B.P.). In the Boreal forests of the Canadian Shield this cultural period is referred to as the “Shield Archaic”. The Archaic period is generally characterized by increasing populations, developments in lithic technology (e.g., ground stone tools), and emerging trade networks.

Archaic populations remained hunter-gatherers with an increasing emphasis on fishing. People began to organise themselves into small family groups operating in a seasonal migration, congregating annually at resource-rich locations for social, religious, political, and economic activities. Sites from this period in the region include Morrison's Island-2 (BkGg-10), Morrison's Island-6 (BkGg-12) and Allumette Island-1 (BkGg-11) near Pembroke, and the Lamoureaux site (BiFs-2) in the floodplain of the South Nation River (Clermont 1999). Often sites from this time are located on islands, waterways, and at narrows on lakes and rivers where caribou and deer would cross, suggesting a common widespread use of the birchbark canoe that was so prominent in later history (McMillan 1995). It is suggested that the Algonquin peoples in the Ottawa Valley area developed out of this Shield Archaic culture.

Woodland / Pre-European Contact Period

Generally, the introduction of the use of ceramics marks the transition from the Archaic Period into the Woodland period. Populations continued to participate in extensive trade networks that extended across much of North America. Social structure appears to have become increasingly complex with some status differentiation recognized in burials. Towards the end of this period domesticated plants were gradually introduced to the Ottawa Valley region. This coincided with other changes including the development of semi-permanent villages. The Woodland period is commonly divided into the Early Woodland (1000 – 300 B.C.), Middle Woodland (400 B.C. to A.D. 1000), and the Late Woodland (A.D. 900 – European Contact) periods.

The Early Woodland is typically noted via lithic point styles (i.e., Meadowood bifaces) and pottery types (i.e., Vinette I). Early Woodland sites in the Ottawa Valley region include Deep River (CaGi-1) (Mitchell 1963), Constance Bay I (BiGa-2) (Watson 1972), and Wyght (BfGa-11) (Watson 1980). The Middle Woodland period is identified primarily via changes in pottery style (e.g., the addition of decoration). Some of the best documented Middle Woodland Period sites from the region are from Leamy Lake Park (BiFw-6, BiFw-16) (Laliberté 1999). On the shield and in other non-arable environments, including portions of the Ottawa Valley, there seems to remain a less sedentary lifestyle often associated with the Algonquin groups noted in the region at contact (Wright 2004:1485–1486).

The Woodland Period Algonquin peoples had a social and economic rhythm of life following an annual cyclical pattern of seasonal movements. Subsistence was based on small independent extended family bands operating an annual round of hunting, fishing, and plant collecting. Families returned from their winter hunting camps to rejoin with other groups at major fishing sites for the summer. The movements of the people were connected with the rhythm of the natural world around them allowing for efficient and generally sustainable subsistence (Ardoch Algonquin First Nation 2015). Their annual congregations facilitated essential social, political, and cultural exchange.

The Algonquin peoples also established significant trade networks and a dominance of the Ottawa River (in Algonquian the “Kitchissippi”) and its tributaries. The trade networks following the Ottawa River connected the Algonquins to an interior eastern waterway via Lake Timiskaming and the Rivière des Outaouais to the St. Maurice and Saguenay as well as the upper Great Lakes and interior via Lake Nipissing and Georgian Bay. From there their Huron allies would distribute goods to the south and west. The Iroquois and their allies along the St. Lawrence River and the lower Great Lakes dominated the trade routes on those waterways to the south thus leading to a rivalry that would escalate with European influence (Moreau et al. 2016).

European Contact

The addition of European trade goods to artifacts of native manufacture in archaeological material culture assemblages’ ushers in a new period of history. Archaeological data shows that European goods penetrated the Canadian Shield as early as 1590 and the trade was well entrenched by 1600 through the trade routes established by the Anishinabe Algonquin peoples along the Ottawa River (Moreau et al. 2016) and their neighbouring allies the Michi Saagiig and the Chippewa nations.

The first recorded meeting between Europeans and Anishinabe Algonquin occurred at the first permanent French settlement on the St. Lawrence at Tadoussac in the summer of 1603. Samuel de Champlain came upon a party of Algonquins, the Kitchissipirini under Chief Tessouat, who were celebrating a recent victory over the Iroquois with their allies the Montagnais and Malecite (Hessel 1993). Champlain made note of the “Algoumequins” and his encounter with them, yet the initial contact between Champlain and the Algonquin people within their own territory in the Ottawa Valley was during his travels of exploration in 1613.

By the time of Champlain’s 1613 journey, the Anishinabe Algonquin people along the Ottawa River Valley were important middlemen in the rapidly expanding fur-trade industry. Champlain knew this and wanted to form and strengthen alliances with the Algonquins to further grow the fur-trade, and to secure guidance and protection for future explorations inland and north towards a potential northwest passage. Further, involving the Algonquins deeper in the fur trade promised more furs filling French ships and more Indigenous dependence on European goods. For their part, the French offered the promise of safety and support against the Iroquois to the south.

Early historical accounts note many different Algonquian speaking groups in the region at the time. Of note for the lower Ottawa Valley area were the Kichesipirini (focused around Morrison Island); Matouweskariini (upstream from Ottawa, along the Madawaska River); Weskarini (around the Petite Nation, Lièvre, and Rouge rivers west of Montreal), Kinouchepirini (in the Bonnechere River drainage); and the Onontchataronon, (along the South Nation River) (Holmes and Associates 1993a; Morrison 2005; Pilon 2005). However, little archaeological work has been undertaken regarding Anishinabe Algonquin at the time of contact with Europeans (Pilon 2005).

Fur Trade, Early Contact with the French

Champlain understood that the Anishinabe Algonquin would be vital to his eventual success in making his way inland, exploring, and expanding the fur trade. This was partially due to their language being the key to communication with many other groups, as well as their dominance over trade routes surrounding the Ottawa River and the connection with the Huron in the west.

When the French arrived, there was already a vast trade network in place linking the Huron and the Algonquins, the Michi Saagiig and Chippewa, extending from the Saguenay to Huronia. This route existed at least from the very early beginnings of agricultural societies in Ontario around A.D. 1000 (Moreau et al. 2016). This trade increased rapidly after the arrival of the Europeans with the introduction of European goods and the demand for furs. The Huron held a highly strategic commercial location controlling the trade to the south and the west, and the Algonquin, Michi Saagiig, and Chippewa were their critical connection to goods from the east, including European products.

By the mid-17th century, the demands of the fur trade had caused major impacts to the traditional way of life including a change in tools, weapons, and a shift in diet to more European as hunting was more for furs and not for food. This dependence on European food, ammunition, and protection tied people to European settlements (McMillan 1995). The summer gathering sites shifted from prominent fishing areas to trading posts. This further spurred social changes in community structure and traditional land distribution and use.

The well-situated Anishinabe Algonquin, particularly the Kitchespirini who controlled passage around Allumette Island, were originally reluctant to cede any of their dominance in fear of being cut out of their lucrative middleman role in the trade economy. However, an alliance with the French meant protection and assistance against the Iroquois. The French, as well as other Europeans like the Dutch and English, were able to align their own political and economic rivalries with those of the native populations. The competitive greed and obsession with expanding the fur trade entrenched the rivalries that were already in place, and these were intensified by European weapons and economic ambition.

Haudenosaunee (Iroquois) Wars

Little information exists about inter-tribal warfare prior to European contact, however, there was existing animosity between the Haudenosaunee and the Anishinabe Algonquin when Champlain first arrived in the Ottawa Valley. Like his fellow Europeans, Champlain was able to use this existing rivalry to make a case for an alliance, thus gaining crucial access to the established trade networks and economic power of the Anishinabe Algonquin. Prior to European contact, the hostilities had been mainly skirmishes and raids, but everything changed as European reinforcement provided deadlier weapons and higher economic stakes with the introduction of the fur trade.

Along with the French, the Anishinabe Algonquin were allied against the Haudenosaunee with the Huron, Nipissing, Michi Saagiig, and Chippewa. French records suggest that at the end of the sixteenth century the Algonquins were the dominant force and were proud to have weakened and diminished the Iroquois. The first Algonquin campaign the French took part in was a 1609 attack against the Mohawk. The use of firearms in this fight marked the beginning of the escalation of brutality between these old enemies. The Haudenosaunee corn stalk shields could stop arrows but not bullets or French swords (Hessel 1993).

Eventually the tide changed and as the Haudenosaunee exhausted the beaver population in their own territory they became the aggressors, pushing into the lands of the Anishinabe Algonquin, Michi Saagiig, Chippewa, and Huron, with the added strength of Dutch weaponry. Through the 1630s and 40s constant and increased raiding into Anishinabe Algonquin, Michi Saagiig, and Chippewa territory by the Haudenosaunee nations had forced many multi-generational residents to leave their lands in seek protection from their French allies in places like Trois Rivieres and Sillery while others fled to the north. By 1650 Huronia, the home of the

long-time allies of the Anishinabe Algonquin and traditional and treaty territory of the Chippewa, had been destroyed by the Haudenosaunee. The Anishinabe Algonquin of the Ottawa Valley had largely been scattered or displaced, reduced through war and disease to small family groups under the protection of the French missions only fifty years after the first Europeans had travelled the Ottawa River (Morrison 2005:26).

There is some evidence that the Anishinabe Algonquin did not completely abandon the Ottawa Valley but withdrew from the Ottawa River to the headwaters of its tributaries and remained in those interior locations until the end of the century. Taking advantage of the Anishinabe Algonquin absence, the Ottawa people, originally from the area of Manitoulin Island, used the river for trade during this time and their name became historically applied to the river.

Aftermath of War

As the Haudenosaunee push continued and the Anishinabe Algonquin sought refuge amongst their French allies, other factors came into play that significantly contributed to their displacement and near destruction. The introduction of European diseases, the devastating influence of alcohol, and the increasing pressure to convert to Christianity massively contributed to the weakening of the Anishinabe Algonquin people and their traditional culture.

The Anishinabe Algonquin thought of themselves as part of the natural world with which they must live in harmony. The traditional stories of Anishinabe Algonquin folklore contained lessons and guides to behaviour. The French missionaries regarded them as “heathens” and dismissed their religion as superstition (Day 2005). The missionaries believed it was their duty to convert these people to Christianity to save them from evil. Anishinabe Algonquin chief Tessouat had seen his Huron neighbours become ill and die after interactions with the European missionaries and had thus originally warned his people about abandoning their old beliefs and the dangers of conversion (Hessel 1993). Eventually the French imposed laws allowing only those converted to Christianity to remain within the missions and under French protection. This created divisions amongst the Anishinabe Algonquin themselves which weakened the social structure as some settled into a new religion and new territory.

Starting in the 1630s and continuing into the 1700s, European disease spread among the Anishinabe Algonquin groups along the Ottawa River, bringing widespread death (Trigger 1986:230). As disease spread through the French mission settlements the priests remained certain that the suffering was punishment for resisting Christianity. An additional threat lurking amongst the French settlements was alcohol which precipitated many issues.

The Long Way Back

After the Haudenosaunee (Iroquois) Wars, the remaining Anishinabe Algonquin people were generally settled around various French trading posts and missions from the north end of the Ottawa Valley to Montreal. A large settlement at Oka was the first mission established on Anishinabe Algonquin lands in 1720. This settlement included people from many groups who had been collected and moved around from various locations. It became a type of base camp; occupied during the summer while the winters were spent at their traditional hunting territories in the upper Ottawa Valley. This arrangement served the French well, since the Anishinabe Algonquin converts at Oka maintained close ties with the northern bands and could call upon the inland warriors to join them in case of war with the British or Iroquois League.

As the British gained control of Canada from the French in 1758-1760 they included in the Articles of Capitulation a guarantee that the Indigenous allies of the French would be maintained in the lands they inhabited. Many of the Anishinabe Algonquin and other native groups that had been living on French mission settlements were shuffled around to new reserves while others began to migrate back to their traditional territories. Those who had remained on the land and continued to be active in the fur trade, now did so with the English through companies in Montreal like the North West Company, and in the north with the Hudson Bay Company.

Some Anishinabe Algonquin people began to return to their traditional territory to join those groups who had remained in the lower Ottawa Valley and continued their traditional lifeway through to the influx of European settlement in the late 1700s and early 1800s. This included bands noted to be living along the Gatineau River and other rivers flowing into the Ottawa. These traditional bands maintained a seasonal round focused on harvesting activities into the 1800s when development pressures and assimilation policies implemented by the colonial government saw Indigenous lands taken up, albeit under increasing protest and without consideration for Indigenous claims, for settlement and industry. Anishinabe Algonquin lands began to be encroached upon by white settlers involved in the booming lucrative logging industry or having been granted the land as Loyalist soldiers or through other settler groups.

As some Anishinabe Algonquin had been redistributed to lands in Quebec, their traditional territory within the Ottawa Valley was included in multiple land transfer deals, agreements, and sales with the British Crown beginning in the 1780s and continuing till the 1840s. The Anishinabe Algonquin were not included in these transactions and numerous petitions and inquiries on behalf of their interests were often overruled or ignored (Holmes and Associates 1993a; Holmes and Associates 1993b; Sarazin). The Constitution Act of 1791 divided Quebec into the Provinces of Upper and Lower Canada with Ottawa River as the division line, thus the lands claimed by the Algonquins fell under two separate administrations creating more confusion, exclusion, and oversight.

Two “protectorate” communities were eventually established in the nineteenth century for the Anishinabe Algonquin people at Golden Lake in Ontario and River Desert (Maniwaki) in Quebec. One of the last accounts of the Anishinabe Algonquin living traditionally was from 1865. The White Duck family was living just west of Arnprior when they were forced to leave their wigwams as surveyors arrived to tell them the railway was being expanded through their land (Hessel 1993).

Anishinabe Algonquin people continue to live in the wider Ottawa Valley and there are still many speakers of several Algonquian dialects. Outside of the officially recognized bands there are an unspecified number of people of Anishinabe Algonquin descent throughout the Ottawa Valley unaffiliated with any reserve. Today there are ten Anishinabe Algonquin communities that comprise the Algonquins of Ontario: The Algonquins of Pikwàkanagàn First Nation, Antoine, Kijicho Manito Madagouskarini, Bonnechere, Greater Golden Lake, Mattawa/North Bay, Ottawa, Shabot Obaadjiwan, Snimikobi, and Whitney and area.

Struggles to officially secure title to their traditional land and fight for hunting and fishing rights have continued into modern times. The Algonquins of Ontario (AOO) and the Governments of both Canada and Ontario are working together to resolve this land claim through a negotiated settlement. The claim includes an area of 9 million acres of unceded territory within the watersheds of the Ottawa and Mattawa Rivers in Ontario including the city of Ottawa and most of Algonquin Park. The signing of the Agreement-in-Principle in 2016 by the AOO and the provincial and federal governments, signifying a mutual intention for a lasting partnership, was

a key step towards a final agreement to clarify the rights and nurture new economic and development opportunities in the area.

4.2.3 Contact Period

European contact with Indigenous peoples along the St. Lawrence River began with the visits of Jacques Cartier in 1534. The following year, Cartier was only able to travel and map as far as what is now Montreal, due to the impassable Lachine Rapids. The St. Lawrence River earned its name as Cartier first travelled the area on the 10th of August which is the feast day of St. Lawrence. The following year, he travelled upriver as far as Montreal where he encountered the permanent St. Lawrence Iroquois settlements of Stadacona and Hochelaga near present day Quebec City and Montreal, respectively. Cartier's accounts of the St. Lawrence Iroquois are the only that exist of these people at the time of contact, as by the time of Samuel de Champlain's 1603 voyage, these people had disappeared and instead *Algonquian* speaking peoples occupied the area (Jamieson 1990:385). Trading between the French and Natives was minimal in the 16th century as the French saw that the country had little to offer Europe, and trade in furs was not viable until the end of the 16th century. It was not until 1599, when the king of France authorized the colonization of New France, and Champlain's 1603 voyage that permanent French-Native relations were established (Heidenreich 1990:480–483). Following these initial expeditions, the St. Lawrence served as the main artery for European exploration and trade into the interior of North America.

4.2.4 Post-Contact Period

Although the French exerted some influence in the study area through the 17th and 18th centuries, with permanent settlements established to the east and west on the Island of Montreal and Cataraqui (present day Kingston), permanent European settlement did not occur until the end of the 18th century. Despite having gained control of Canada at the end of the Seven Years' War (1754–1763), the British did not express interest in establishing settlements until the end of the American Revolution, when United Empire Loyalists left the newly established Republic. The Governor of Quebec, General Frederick Haldimand, made lands available for settlement for the Loyalists in what would become Upper Canada. In 1783, Captain William Redford Crawford negotiated an agreement that surrendered lands that extended west along the north shore of the St. Lawrence River and Lake Ontario from the Mississauga, whom the British believed to be the sole First Nation peoples in the area, to the British crown. This became known as the 'Crawford Purchase' and included most of eastern Ontario to the Gananoque River. While the British at the time believed the Mississauga with whom they were negotiating were the sole First Nation peoples in the area, most of the lands surrendered in this treaty were the traditional territory of the Algonquins. This transaction was not only problematic for its poor documentation and overlooking other First Nations' rights, it was also never clear on the compensation to be awarded for the lands granted (Gwen Reimer 2019:40–41). In 1784, Major Samuel Holland, Surveyor General for Canada surveyed the new lands.

The original plan of settlement was to extend the *seigneurial* system of the old Province of Quebec westward from the seigneurie of Longueuil (the most westerly of established seigneuries in Quebec). Two ranges of townships were laid out. The first nine townships west of Longueuil were known as the Royal Townships and extended to Cataraqui (Kingston). The next five townships, known as the Cataraqui Townships extended to the Bay of Quinte. Townships were divided into concessions and laid out into 200 acre lots. The original townships were numbered as they were to be a part of the Quebec seigneurial system. Not long after settling in these new townships, the Loyalists petitioned the Crown to establish a British form of land tenure and law,

as there was a good deal of resistance to French custom and law in the newly settled areas (Craig 1963:4-9).

The area had been part of the Montreal District until 1788, when Lord Dorchester, Sir Guy Carleton formed four new districts west of Montreal. From east to west these were Lunenburg, Mecklenburg, Nassau, and Hesse, reflecting the German origins of the Royal family and the many Germans among the Loyalists. The future counties of Leeds and Grenville became affiliated with the most eastern district of Lunenburg, which extended from the eastern edge of Lancaster Township, the first of the Royal Townships, to just below present-day Kingston (Harkness 1946). By 1788, the numbered Royal Townships were named for some of the fifteen children of King George III (1760-1820). With the Canada Act of 1791 that divided Quebec into Upper and Lower Canada, Colonel John Graves Simcoe, first Lieutenant-Governor of Upper Canada, established the original 19 counties. In 1792, the Lunenburg District was renamed the Eastern District. The district was originally bounded to the west by a line running north from the mouth of the Gananoque River and to the east by Lower Canada. This included Grenville County that was surveyed in 1792 and named after Francis Osborne, 5th Duke of Leeds. William Grenville, 1st Baron Grenville, who was the British Secretary of State responsible for the colonies in 1790. It originally comprised five townships: Edwardsburgh, Augusta, Wolford, Oxford-on-Rideau (Oxford), and South Gower. Oxford-on-Rideau township, in which the study area lies, was first surveyed in 1791. In 1798 the new Parliament of Upper Canada divided the Eastern District in two, which was put into effect in 1800. At that time the counties of Carleton, Grenville, and Leeds were drawn out of the Eastern District to form the Johnstown District. In 1850, Leeds County merged with Grenville County to create the United Counties of Leeds and Grenville.

To ensure that the lands were distributed somewhat purposefully within Upper Canada, the British employed measures to distribute settlement throughout the territory, rather than pockets of habitation. One seventh of all surveyed lands were then set aside for the crown, another seventh set aside for the Church and the rest divided between United Empire Loyalists, the military, surveyors, and farmers, with some later sold to the Canada Company (a British-based land development company) (Walker 2012:129). Upon their arrival, Loyalists drew their lots for their free land grants. The 1783 Royal Instructions granted 100 acres to every "Master of a Family", plus an additional 50 acres for each other member. Military claimants were granted from 200 acres for a private, rising from there up to 5,000 acres for a field officer. In 1789, the Dorchester Resolution allowed for the disbursement of 200 acres to be extended to the sons and daughters of the original United Empire Loyalists. Lots fronting on the St. Lawrence were granted first and were usually not more than 200 acres, meaning higher ranking officers would select their further grants in the rear of the townships, often quite distant from their first. Likewise, the grants to children of Loyalists were in the rear of townships or townships further inland (Moorman 1997:11–20). As a result, the entire riverfront within the newly surveyed Townships of Lancaster, Charlottenburgh, Cornwall, Osnabruck, Williamsburg, Matilda, Edwardsburgh, Augusta, and Elizabethtown (the Royal Townships) was settled almost simultaneously, while the rear lots of the township and other townships were granted but not always settled. Generally, Scots were placed in the eastern townships and the western townships were comprised mostly German immigrants.

The Geographic Township of Oxford was first surveyed in 1791, and while most of the township was granted by 1801, only one family was living there, the remaining patent holders were Officers residing in the fronting townships. The modern town of Oxford Mills now stands on the land originally granted to William Snyder in 1802. The community took its name from the saw and grist mills built in the center of the township taking advantage of the sizeable Kemptville Creek, (historically a southern branch of the Rideau River), to power their operations. The

township was incorporated in 1850 and then included the communities of Acton's Corners, Bedell (Kempton), Bishop's Mills, Beckett's Landing, Burritt's Rapids, Christies Corners, East Oxford, Millar's Corners, Newmanville, Oxford Mills, Oxford Station, Patterson's Corners, and Swan Station. Kemptville was part of the township until its incorporation in 1857.

In 1998, Oxford-on-Rideau Township, South Gower Township, and the Town of Kemptville amalgamated to form the Municipality of North Grenville.

4.2.5 Study Area Specific History

The subject property is located at 1486 O'Neill Road, west of Oxford Station and south of Oxford Mills and Kemptville. The study area sits in the northeastern corner of Lot 14, Concession 8, in the Geographic Township of Oxford, in the United Counties of Leeds and Grenville. The historic mapping for the area from 1861 (Map 6) depicts a house in the northeastern portion of the lot belonging to J. McAvoy, and a house in the southern portion of the lot along County Road 20 attributed to W. Dougherty (outside of the study area) (Walling 1862).

The Crown patent for the north half of Lot 14, Concession 8 was in 1855 to John McAvoy. Twelve years later, in 1867, McAvoy sold the property to James Anderson for \$2,000. Another twelve years passed, and Anderson sold the land to Albert Buker in 1879. In 1887, Buker sold one acre in the northeastern portion to the municipal council of the Township of Oxford for a gravel pit for public use. Upon his death in 1918, Albert Buker's widow Letitia quit her claim in preference to Emmaline Crawford and Annie Bailey, her stepdaughters. In 1920 Emmaline and Annie and their husbands sold the land to Stanley John Sanderson. In 1955 Sanderson sold the property to William E. Brown Construction Ltd. (LRO (015)).

The 1851 census records list John McAvoy as a 30-year-old Irish-born farmer living with his wife Mary and four young children (Statistics Canada 1851). Their youngest child, Elizabeth (aged 2 in 1851), is not listed in the 1861 records suggesting she died sometime before reaching the age of 12. By 1861, the McAvoy household had grown significantly. John and Mary had seven children ranging in ages from 3 months to 17 years. Living with them were three other members of the McAvoy family, Mark aged 60, Jane aged 20, and Eliza aged 6 months, however their specific relation to John and Mary is not clear. All twelve McAvoy's, from babies to the elderly, are listed as living in a one-story log house (Statistics Canada 1861).

Multiple households of the Buker family can be found throughout the historic census records for Oxford Township. The 1861 census lists Albert Buker as 19 years old, living with his parents and five siblings (Statistics Canada 1861). By the time of the 1871 census, Albert was married to Elizabeth and they had three young daughters, Mary Jane, aged 5, Emmaline, aged 3, and Jessie, aged 1 (Statistics Canada 1871). By 1881, the family still included three daughters, yet the youngest was Ann, aged 8, suggesting Jessie died before the age of 11 (Statistics Canada 1881). The 1891 census lists Albert and Elizabeth living with their two youngest daughters, while the eldest, Mary Jane, had presumably married and moved out by that time (Statistics Canada 1891). By the time of the 1901 census little had changed, Emmaline, aged 31, and Ann, aged 27, still lived at home with their parents who were by then in their late fifties (Statistics Canada 1901). Significant changes had occurred in the following decade as by the time of the 1911 census Albert had been widowed and had a new wife, Leticia, while Emmaline and Ann had both been married (Statistics Canada 1911). Albert died in 1918 at the age of 73 (Ancestry.com 2012).

4.3 Archaeological Context

4.3.1 Current Conditions

The 1,460 m² J. McAvoy site sits within a former agricultural field turned residential yard which was open, level, and under long grass at the time of the Stage 3 assessment (Figure 1 to Figure 3). The site is within a larger development property to the southwest of the intersection of O'Neill Road and Patterson's Corners Road, just north of the hamlet of East Oxford (Map 1, SD Map 1). The property is bounded to the north by O'Neill Road, to the east by Patterson's Corners Road, to the south by County Road 20, and to the west by the agricultural fields of the neighbouring farm.

4.3.2 Physiography

The development area lies within the Edwardsburg Sand Plains physiographic region (Map 7). In this region the bedrock and most of the boulder clay are covered by beds of sand. The surface of the sand plain is nearly level or slightly undulating, although hummocks and ridges appear in some places. The sand is glaciofluvial in origin. As the land emerged from below the level of the Champlain Sea a few beach ridges were formed on the high ground and some drier areas became dunes. The water table generally stands near the surface, so much so that shallow muck and even peat bogs have frequently developed. Common forest on this plain is moisture-loving trees including elm, ash, soft maple, and white cedar while tamarack and black cedar are seen in the bogs and wetter lands, and white pine, hard maple, birch, and burr oak on the ridges. The soils are acid and deficient in all important nutrients. This land is best for pasture or crops for feeding stock and has thus been historically well known for dairy production (Chapman and Putnam 2007).

The soil in the development area consists of Uplands series soils (Map 7). The parent materials of the Upland soils were deposited by water as it flowed out over the area in front of the glacier. As the rate of flow of water decreased, particles of sand and fine gravel settled out to form the outwash plains of today. The Uplands soil series developed on these strongly undulating to rolling outwash materials of sand or sandy loam under good to excessive drainage conditions. There are no boulders within the profile although very occasionally one may be found on the surface. The natural forest for this soil type is a coniferous forest. The cultivated surface soil is very low in organic matter and available plant nutrients are in short supply. The soil is not well suited to general farming because of low fertility and a tendency to be droughty (Matthews and Richards 1954).

The surficial geology in the development area consists of foreshore-basinal deposits of sand (Map 7). Basinal deposits are defined by a fine-to medium-grained sand, calcareous and commonly fossiliferous. It is a nearshore sand that generally occurs as a sheet or as bars or spits associated with glaciofluvial materials.

There are no primary water sources within the immediate vicinity of the development area, however, there is marshland just to the west and Kemptville Creek flows 2 kilometres to the west and north of the study area.

4.3.3 Previous Archaeological Assessments

The previous Stage 1 archaeological assessment of the property concluded the study area had both pre-contact Indigenous as well as historical Euro-Canadian archaeological potential (Matrix

Heritage 2022). The subsequent Stage 2 assessment encountered two 19th century archaeological sites with CHVI that were recommended for Stage 3 assessment: the J. McAvoy Site (BfFv-21) detailed in this report, and the L. Russell Site (BfFv-22) further west (SD Map 1). Stage 3 assessment of the L. Russell Site determined that the site had CHVI warranting Stage 4 Mitigation of Development Impact (Matrix Heritage 2024).

4.3.4 Registered Archaeological Sites and Commemorative Plaques

A search of the Ontario Archaeological Sites Database indicated that there are no registered archaeological sites located within a 1 km radius of the study area other than the sites noted herein, the J. McAvoy and L. Russell Sites. The L. Russell Site (BfFv-22) was encountered during the Stage 2 investigation for the current development property and is another 19th century Euro-Canadian farmstead site located in the north central portion of the property, within Lot 13, Concession 8. Stage 3 assessment of the L. Russell Site determined that the site had CHVI warranting Stage 4 Mitigation of Development Impact (Matrix Heritage 2024).

An expanded search indicated that there was one other registered archaeological site within a 5 km radius of the study area. That site is the Oxford Mills Gristmill Site (BfFw-1), a post-contact historic Euro-Canadian mill site located within the village of Oxford Mills.

No commemorative plaques or monuments are located within 1 km of the subject property.

4.4 Archaeological Potential

Potential for pre-contact Indigenous sites is based on physiographic variables that include distance from the nearest source of water, the nature of the nearest source/body of water, distinguishing features in the landscape (e.g., ridges, knolls, eskers, wetlands), the types of soils found within the area of assessment, and resource availability. The development area has potential for pre-contact Indigenous archaeological sites based on the sandy soils, the proximity to a wetland water source, and the natural beach ridge through the centre of the property.

Potential for historical Euro-Canadian sites is based on proximity to historical transportation routes, historical community buildings such as schools, churches, and businesses, and any known archaeological or culturally significant sites. The development area exhibits potential for historical period Euro-Canadian archaeological sites based on the early patent dates, the early occupation of the property, and the proximity to the historical routes of Patterson's Corner's Road and O'Neill Road.

5.0 Field Methods

Relocation of the area of the site identified through the Stage 2 assessment was achieved using an iPad with ESRI ArcGIS Field Map. Average accuracy at the time of survey was approximately 5 m horizontal (Standard 2, Section 3.2.1).

As per the Stage 2 recommendations for the J. McAvoy Site (BfFv-21), in keeping with Section 3.2.2 and Table 3.1 of the *Standards and Guidelines for Consulting Archaeologists* and Section 3 of the *Archaeology of Rural Historical Farmsteads* (MCM 2014), as it appeared that the site would proceed to Stage 4, the Stage 3 grid was laid out in the form of 1x1 m excavation units on a 10 m grid with infill units numbering 40% of the unit total as per Points 3 and 4 in Table 3.1, Section 3.2.2 (MCM 2011).

During Stage 3 excavations, skeletal material was encountered and initially determined to be foetal human remains. Following police notification, attendance at the scene, clearance of concerns regarding foul play, a Burial Site Investigation (BSI) order was issued by the Registrar, Funeral, Burial and Cremation Services Act, 2002 (herein referred to as the Registrar). Accordingly, a BSI was initiated under Stage 3 PIF number P369-0412-2023. Subsequently, as the BSI investigations progressed, it was determined that the initial skeletal material uncovered was not human remains, but rather those of a foetal pig which were associated with other small animal burials uncovered during the BSI including a cat and three other foetal pigs. The determination as foetal pig was definitive as the articulated skeleton was uncovered, including the tail. The burial site investigation and the associated PIF were therefore cancelled, and the investigation results and artifacts collected are included herein.

In total, the Stage 3 assessment of the J. McAvoy Site (BfFv-21) covered the Stage 2 artifact scatter and consisted of the excavation of a total of 57 1x1 m units. The initial Stage 3 includes 16 units on the 10 m grid with 7 off-grid infill units consisting of 44% of the grid total placed to investigate artifact concentrations, drop-offs, and other features. The falsely triggered BSI resulted in 34 units concentrated on the find location for the skeletal remains and on a checkerboard pattern as the start of completing a 5 m clearance buffer around the initial skeletal find as requested by the Registrar (Map 3, SD Map 3).

The J. McAvoy Site (BfFv-21) Stage 3 assessment area was broadly determined through the results of the Stage 2, refined during Stage 3 excavation through repetitive low yield units on the peripheries which were initially determined with field tallies of artifacts (Maps 4 and 5, SD Maps 4 and 5). To lend further rigour to the process, ESRI's ArcMap Pro was employed in the post-excavation analysis to empirically determine quantitative categories of artifact yields using Jenks Natural Breaks classification method with five classes plus an added sixth sterile class (Table 1). When plotting the artifact distribution across the site using unit tallies of all artifact classes, this was contrasted to tallies excluding faunal material (compare Maps 4 and 5). This made it apparent that inflated faunal counts in the core of the site relating to the animal burials were skewing the Jenks Breaks results. To ensure better representation of the artifact distribution, tallies excluding faunal remains are presented and used to formulate the Stage 4 recommendations (Map 4, SD Map 4). These refined results help empirically determine the extent of the site and high yield areas contrasted to the periphery and low to very low yield categories.

All test units were stratigraphically hand excavated to a depth of 5 cm into subsoil, and all soil was screened using 6 mm mesh (Figure 4 and Figure 5). When cultural features were found, they were recorded in plan as exposed, covered with geotextile fabric and backfilled as per Standard 6 Section 3.2.2. (MCM 2011). Features that were fully exposed were excavated as per Guideline 3 of Section 3.2.2 (MCM 2011). Two features, Feature A and B, were fully exposed, recorded in plan view, cross sectioned, and stratigraphically excavated. Both features were determined to be small animal burials.

Each unit and feature was recorded on a standardized digital context sheet, which included a record of at least one profile, typically the north (Figure 6 and Figure 7). All recovered artifacts were collected by stratigraphic lot, and their provenience recorded. All artifacts were returned to the lab facility for washing, sorting, inventory, analysis, and storage. All excavated units were backfilled upon completion (Figure 8).

Two site datums (wooden stakes) were established: a fixed point within the archaeological site and a datum off site (Map 3, SD Map 3). UTM Zone 18T coordinates were determined for the datums using an iPhone X pro interfaced with ArcGIS Field Map and the averaging of 10 readings. Average accuracy per reading during the survey was approximately 4 m (Standard 3 Section 3.2 MCM 2011). The excavation grid was established with a Nikon DTM-322 total station and all excavation units and site features were total station surveyed. All survey data is compiled into ArcGIS and every survey point has a UTM Zone 18T NAD 83 coordinate. Site and datum coordinates are provided in the supplementary documentation.

The provenience system used for this project is based on the Stage 3 Matrix Heritage project number (MH1207), plus the grid coordinates of the northwest corner of the excavation unit, followed by the lot number. Thus, the provenience of an artifact from Lot 1 in unit 500E 800N would be recorded as MH1207 500E 800N-1. During the BSI portion, those units were initially recorded under project number MH1221, however for consistency all artifacts were catalogued under MH1207.

Photographs were taken during fieldwork to document the current land conditions (see Map 3, SD Map 3 for photo locations by figure number) as per Standard 1.a., Section 7.8.6 (MCM 2011). Additionally, a representative sample of all categories of diagnostic artifacts were photographed (Section 7.5.11, Standards 1-2). Photo catalogue, artifact inventory, map inventory, and daily field notes (including sketch maps drawn in the field) are listed in Appendix A, B, C, and D.

Field work was carried out over 10 days on September 12 to 15, 27 to 29, October 2 to 4, 2023. Weather conditions varied from sunny to overcast and temperatures ranging from 17 to 29° C. Permission to access the property was provided by Tomlinson without restrictions.

6.0 Engagement

As a component of the assessment process the Algonquins of Pikwakanagan and the Algonquins of Ontario were engaged and asked if they wished to participate in the field work and to provide report review and comments. A liaison from the AOO was present for much of the excavation process. A record of Indigenous engagement is provided in the supplementary documentation package.

7.0 Record of Finds

All artifacts from the J. McAvoy Site (BfFv-21) are contained in one banker’s box, held at Matrix Heritage’s lab facility for long term storage. All artifact dates are sourced from the Parks Canada Archaeological Resources Database (Parks Canada 2012) unless otherwise noted.

A total of 58 1x1 m units were excavated during the Stage 3 investigation of the J. McAvoy Site (BfFv-21), 23 as part of the initial Stage 3 and 35 as part of the BSI. These units are listed below in Table 2.

7.1 Stratigraphy

Stratigraphy across the site generally consists of two layers: a topsoil former plow zone of dark brown loamy sand (15-35 cm thick) over yellow to orange sandy subsoil (Figure 9 to Figure 12). Occasionally a culturally sterile interface layer between the topsoil plough zone and subsoil was recorded.

7.2 Features

Two cultural features were identified at the J. McAvoy site, both during the excavations for the BSI (Map 4 and SD Map 4). The features were fully exposed, excavated, photographed, and recorded.

Feature A was a circular pit within units 494E 805N, 495E 805N, 494E 804N, and 495E 804N. The feature was fully exposed in plan and excavated as it was believed to be associated with the erroneously identified human remains uncovered from unit 495E 805N. Excavation of the feature revealed an articulated cat skeleton (Figure 13), not associated with the previously found bones.

Feature B was a rectangularly shaped pit with sharply defined edges located just to the east of Feature A mainly within unit 495E 804N and extending north into unit 495E 805N. The feature was fully exposed in plan and excavated as part of the BSI as it was also believed to relate to the erroneously identified human remains. However, excavation revealed the remains to be those of four articulated fetal pigs (Figure 14 and Figure 15). Upon re-evaluation following the excavation of Feature B, it was concluded that the initial discovery believed to be human remains was in fact cranial fragments from one of these animals and was therefore not human.

7.3 Artifacts

An assemblage of 6,052 artifacts was recovered from the Stage 3 assessment of the J. McAvoy Site (BfFv-21). Most of the finds consist of ceramic fragments with glass, metal, and bone representing most of the remainder of the collection. The assemblage sorted by material type is summarized in Table 3. Interestingly, 182 of the ceramic and glass fragments were identified as being burned or melted, and 88 of the bone fragments were calcined denoting a possible burning or fire event.

A total of 2,999 ceramic artifacts were recovered, which represent half of the entire assemblage. Vessel types represented include hollowares and tablewares, of which refined white earthenware is the dominant ware type. Other ceramic artifacts include mainly smoking pipe pieces.

The next most common material type was fauna, with a total of 2,415 fragments representing 40% of the assemblage. This group consists mainly of mammal bone and teeth fragments with some bird bone, eggshell, and mollusc shell. One four-holed bone button is included in this material category.

Glass artifacts consist mainly of fragments of pane glass (n=241), and various bottle glass fragments (n=59). The remainder of the glass artifacts include tumbler fragments, beads, and

lamp chimney glass. Metal objects include mostly ferrous and copper alloy items. Most of the metal artifacts consisted of various fasteners (n=202), with the rest of the metal assemblage comprising personal objects, containers, tools, and domestic items. The construction material category consists of brick, mortar, and plaster fragments. The lithic category represents two gun flints, slate board fragments, a slate pencil, and some mica pieces. Flora refers to collected charcoal samples. The sole synthetic item is vulcanite smoking pipe mouthpiece.

The site can be better understood when the assemblage is analyzed by functional groups (Table 4). Almost half of the assemblage (49% n=2,980) consists of household or domestic items, primarily ceramic fragments. This is consistent with a domestic site, and the identification as the 19th century McAvoy homestead. Flora and fauna make up 40% (n=2425) of the assemblage, generally this is largely representing the four fetal pigs and the cat recovered from Features A and B, but also includes some domestic farm animals butchered for meat. The next most common finds are structural items (8% n=475), which consist primarily of fasteners, pane glass, bricks, and mortar. Personal items such as smoking pipes, clothing items, and slate board fragments, make up only 2% of the assemblage (n=112) but are some of the more interesting finds as they tell us more about the inhabitants of the site. The tools and equipment category (1% n=60) includes two gun flints and represents the agricultural and rural aspect of the site.

7.3.1 Household/Domestic

This broad category is the largest represented at the J. McAvoy Site. Of the 2,980 artifacts in this functional grouping, the majority (97%, n=2,903) are ceramic sherds. These ceramic artifacts represent a variety of vessel types primarily made of refined white earthenware and coarse red earthenware (Figure 16 to Figure 18). Ware types from this assemblage are summarized in Table 5.

Refined white earthenware (RWE) (1830+) sherds are the most common, accounting for 1,523 or 53% of the ceramic assemblage. Most of these sherds are plain or undecorated, accounting for 953 sherds, but the small size of some fragments may reflect plain areas on a decorated vessel. The remaining RWE sherds (n=570) have some decorative technique applied.

The next most common ware type is coarse earthenware (n=1,261), almost all of which is red, accounting for 43% of the ceramic assemblage. The next most common types are the utilitarian yellowware (n=40, 1%, 1827-1972), and fine red earthenware (n=40, 1%). Smaller numbers of other ware types present include pearlware (n=18, 1%, 1775-1830), coarse stoneware (n=16, 1%, 1800-1910), vitrified white earthenware (n=4, <1%, 1845+), and Creamware (n=1, <1%, 1775-1830).

A common ceramic type referred to as creamware was first introduced in the mid-18th century as a British-produced ceramic ware type to replace Chinese export porcelain. Potters continued to experiment to achieve the glassy, slightly bluish look of Chinese porcelain and in the 1770s production developments resulted in a ceramic with a whiter body and the addition cobalt to the lead oxide glaze produced a bluish tinge. In 1779, Josiah Wedgwood coined the term ‘pearl white’ (G.L. Miller and Hunter 2001). One undecorated ceramic fragment is identified as creamware, and 14 pieces of pearlware are present in the J. McAvoy Site assemblage. Three of the pearlware fragments have moulded floral designs with painted brown or orange accents, and two other fragments have floral painted decoration (Figure 16).

By the end of the 18th century, potters attempted to achieve the very white look of bone china, which was done mainly by reducing the amount of cobalt used in the glaze. This produced RWE, with a whiter body more reminiscent of porcelain, eventually replacing pearlware as the dominant ware type (Jefferson Patterson Park 2015b). Vitrified white earthenware (VWE) was first introduced in the 1840s as an inexpensive and durable white semi-vitrified to vitrified ware type with the appearance of porcelain. VWE, also known as ironstone, took several decades to become a popular ware type in Ontario, not becoming widespread until the 1860s and by the 1870s it was often the dominant tableware in many Ontario households (Kenyon 1991:7-8). Over half of the ceramic assemblage, 1,523 fragments, from the J. McAvoy site is refined white earthenware compared to only four fragments, <1%, of vitrified white earthenware.

Despite a chronological development of these ceramic types, earlier ware types were still available throughout the 19th century and used alongside their newer counterparts. Furthermore, there was not a rigid progression between these ceramic developments, but rather fluid transitions. This creates what archaeologists refer to as transitional wares. That said, the assemblage of waretypes from the J. McAvoy site is dominated by RWE, indicative of a mid-19th century occupation.

A diverse selection of decorative patterns is present on the RWE from the J. McAvoy Site (Figure 16 and Figure 17, Table 6). The noted decorative styles are present on table and teawares, though most ceramic sherds are too small to identify specific vessel forms.

The most common decorative technique in the assemblage is transfer printed designs (n=359, 1830+) (Figure 16). Transfer patterns were made by engraving on a copper plate to which the pigment was applied and transferred to the ceramic vessel on a special tissue-like paper. Printed wares allowed complex decorations that were uniform, meaning it was possible to have exactly matching pieces comprising a set of tableware versus hand decorated wares that showed some variation. As such, transfer printed wares were the most expensive decorative style (George L. Miller 1980:3-4). Most of the transfer printed wares present in the assemblage could not be

identified to a specific pattern due to the small size of the fragments, however, the Willow pattern is depicted on 14 fragments, all in blue.

Transfer printed colours in the assemblage include blue, black, purple, green, brown, and mulberry. There were six pieces in the assemblage with a flown transfer print decoration (1844-1880), all in blue. This decorative style was produced using the same patterns as regular transfer prints, but they had volatilizing chemicals placed in the kiln during the glaze firing which caused the colors to flow beyond the original engraved pattern lines, producing a halo-like effect.

After transfer print, the next most common decorative type in the assemblage is painted with floral designs (n=135) (Figure 17). These consist of broad brushed floral patterns using late palette colours (green, pink, blue, and black), identified by the use of chrome colours that became common after 1830 with the introduction of borax into the glazes. Since underglaze red and pink colors were not available until chrome oxides were introduced, these indicate a post 1830 date. There are four pieces of pearlware in the assemblage that are painted with an early palette brown and blue paint (1805-1835).

Industrial slipped designs on refined white earthenware (n=93, 1830-1930) represent utilitarian wares such as bowls and mugs (Figure 17). These designs were produced by turning vessels on horizontal lathes while decorations were applied with coloured slip. Most of the RWE sherds exhibit banding (n=54) in blue, black, orange, grey, green, and brown, a fundamental decoration on factory made slipware. Bands of slip were added by trailing them with a slip bottle onto a vessel mounted horizontally on a turning lathe. This type of decoration often appeared in conjunction with other forms of slip ware decoration. Other common slipped designs present in the assemblage including mocha (n=8), rouletted (n=7), and cabled or cat's eye (n=2). The mocha pattern features a coloured slipped band adorned with a tree-like branching pattern that resembles the natural marking on moss agate, known as 'mocha stone' as it was imported from the port of Mocha (el Mukha in Yemen) (Carpentier and Rickard 2001). The motif was created using a brush dipped in a solution of "mocha tea" (usually made of urine, tobacco juice, and hops) applied onto the wet slip-coated surface of the vessel. The design spread instantly when the acidic solution met the alkaline slip. Rouletted bands were created with an embossed wheel that pressed a repetitive pattern into the vessel and then it was painted over with a glaze that looked darker where the glaze pooled. The cabled and cat's eye designs were applied with a multi-chambered vessel that could apply multiple colours at once, either as a single drop that resembles a cat's eye, or overlapping drops that created a cable.

A variety of sponged wares in blue, pink, and green are present in the assemblage (n=89) (Figure 16). Along with cut sponged stamped motifs, sponged wares were common from 1845 onwards, with the greatest popularity from the 1840s to 1870s (Jefferson Patterson Park 2015).

The ceramic assemblage demonstrates some degree of variation in attributes for edged ware vessels (n=86, 1830-1890) (Figure 17). The most dominant style in the assemblage is scalloped impressed rims (n=34). Other variations include unscalloped impressed rims (n=8), unscalloped unimpressed rims (n=8), and fragments partially determinable including unscalloped rims (n=8), impressed (n=7), and scalloped rims (n=5). A total of 16 sherds are too fragmentary to identify further than unidentified edged ware. All except one of the edged sherds are blue, which is the predominant colour of edged ware found in Ontario. There is one fragment of green edged ware in the assemblage which was commonly found alongside blue, while other colours such as red occur rarely (Kenyon 1991:6).

There were nine fragments of refined white earthenware with a moulded design (1830+), and two pieces with a Canary glaze (Figure 16). Canary ware (1780-1835) is a refined whiteware with a glossy bright yellow glaze which comes from antimony.

The second most common type of ceramic in the assemblage after RWE are coarse earthenwares (n=1,261), of red or buff fabric decorated with varying green, brown, yellow, grey, and clear glazes, while some are unglazed (Figure 18). These utilitarian ware forms consist of food storage containers including crocks, pots, bottles, and jugs, as well as food preparation vessels including milk pans. Crocks, pots, and jugs were used for medium to long term storage of liquids and foodstuff such as vinegar, cooking oil, cream, butter, and cheese. Many shards of coarse red earthenware in the assemblage are likely from milk pans. Milk pans were used as mixing bowls or food preparation vessels largely in the separation of cream from milk as the wide everted sides and rim made it easier to pour out separated milk and cream.

A common ceramic type in the assemblage is yellowware (n=40), another utilitarian ware (Figure 18). While most fragments are plain, there are four pieces with blue banded industrial slip decoration, and one piece with a Rockingham glaze (1835-1900). Rockingham glazed vessels were inexpensive, mass-produced wares of the mid-19th to early 20th centuries. First manufactured in England, as Staffordshire potters emigrated, potteries in North America began producing this ware type as well. Rockingham glazes adorned a variety of vessel forms for kitchen, dining and ornamental use (Maryland Archaeological Conservation Laboratory 2015a).

A total of 40 Jackfield-like decorated fine red earthenware sherds are present in the assemblage, one of which appears to be the spout of a teapot (Figure 18). Jackfield production is historically associated with the town of Jackfield in Shropshire, however it was commonly produced in Staffordshire by potters like Thomas Whieldon (thus the use of "Jackfield-type" wares). Jackfield has a dense, purplish-black to gray refined earthenware body, highly-fired, with a glossy black lead glaze. Jackfield developed in the 1740s and was most popular in the 1750s and 1760s, but "degenerate" versions continued to be made in small amounts into the 19th century (Barker 1990:34–35). There was a revival of the Jackfield glaze in the late nineteenth century, but these versions are usually found on white earthenware or terra cotta (Maryland Archaeological Conservation Laboratory 2015b), and such types are referred to in here as "Jackfield-like." Common Jackfield and Jackfield-like ware types are tea wares and pitchers.

A total of 16 coarse stoneware fragments were recovered from the J. McAvoy site (Figure 18). There are eight fragments with an Albany slip interior (1840-1910), and two fragments with a Derbyshire glaze (1800-1900), generally used for blacking or ink bottles. Four other fragments have a light brown glaze with the remaining pieces having a clear salt glaze.

Glass household artifacts (n=65) consist of fragments of bottle glass (n=60), tumblers (n=3), lamp chimney (n=1), and a jar (n=1) (Figure 19). The bottle glass in the assemblage has some variation of colours including dark olive green, light green, aqua, and colourless. One bottle finish was recovered from the site: a flare or trumpet finish from a small pharmaceutical or toiletry bottle. Five bottle fragments have embossed letters or designs, but all are too fragmentary to discern design or words conclusively. Bottle types from the assemblage are largely unidentified due to the fragmented state, however types include beverage bottles, like wine and case bottles, as well as pharmaceutical panel bottles.

Non ceramic and non glass household items in the assemblage include eight fragments of utensil handles (including two knives), two fragments of decorative hardware (one iron and one copper alloy), a fragment of a kitchen strainer, and a piece of cast iron cooking pot (Figure 19).

7.3.2 Flora/ Fauna

A total of 2,425 fragments of faunal material and 12 pieces of charcoal were recovered from the J. McAvoy Site. Of the bone fragments, 2,389 are identified as mammal bone (including 73 teeth), and 5 are identified as bird bone. Of the mammal remains, 1,607 (66%) are from the two features with 656 from the cat burial of Feature A, and the burial of four foetal pigs in Feature B accounting for 951 pieces. The remainder of the faunal assemblage consisted of 11 mollusc shell fragments and eight pieces of eggshell. Of the bone fragments, 70 were burned or calcined.

7.3.3 Structural

Structural items include windowpane glass (n=240), a variety of fasteners (n=196), mortar (n=21), red brick fragments (n=8), possible ceramic tiles (n=6), mica fragments (n=3), and plaster (n=1) (Table 7) (Figure 20). Cut nails, common between 1830 and 1890, were the most frequent fastener encountered with a total of 140. A total of 47 wrought nails were found, these were the most common nail type before 1830, and continued to be used after this date. There were only two wire nails in the assemblage. Wire nails were developed in the 1850s and commonplace from the 1890s onwards. Other structural fasteners include tacks (n=4), bolts (n=2), and a screw.

7.3.1 Personal and Societal

Although the 112 “Personal” items represent only 2% of the artifacts recovered from the site, they remain some of the more interesting finds as they have the power to remove the anonymity of individuals from the past.

Smoking was a common pastime in the 19th century. The low cost of smoking pipes, which were considered disposable items, often creates a high number of pipe fragments that appear on historical archaeological sites. A total of 90 fragments of white clay smoking pipes were found, which includes 50 bowl fragments, 37 stem fragments, and three pipe shank and bowl juncture fragments (Figure 21). Almost half of the pipe bowls have some evidence of decoration. Eight have a ribbed design, seven have an effigy decoration of a human head, three are TD, one has a lacrosse stick design, one has a floral pattern, and two have an indeterminate decoration. Two of the 14 stem fragments have maker’s marks, both Murray of Glasgow. The presence of a maker’s name and city of manufacture on the opposite side of the stem did not become common until the 1840s. Two of the stem pieces had a yellow glazed mouthpiece. In addition to the white clay smoking pipe fragments there was one composite smoking pipe mouthpiece made of vulcanized rubber.

Clothing items in the assemblage include five buttons, two faceted amber glass beads, a buckle, a shoe eyelet, a copper alloy pin, and both parts of a hook and eye clothing fastener (Figure 22). One button is made of iron, one is a four-hole bone button, and the other three are copper alloy. One copper alloy button has “Best Quality London” impressed on the back.

Other personal/societal items in the collection include seven slate board fragments, a slate pencil, a ceramic figurine fragment, and a folding pocketknife blade (Figure 22).

7.3.2 Tools and Equipment

The broad tools and equipment category includes two English Brandon gun flints and a spall gun flint, identifiable hand tools like a three-square file and a woodworking wedge, as well as agricultural items like horseshoe nails (Figure 20). Numerous corroded fragments of flat iron sheet, strap, and wire are likely associated with various containers, buckets, and/ or barrels. Less diagnostic equipment pieces include hooks, a disc, a rod, and various unidentifiable fragments. Two of the gunflints are typical British Brandon gunflints made from black glassy flint found in the Brandon area of England. It was not until the late 18th century that the blade or prismatic style characterized as distinctly British emerged. These have well-defined sharp parallel ridges on the convex surface and was made by sectioning blades struck from prepared lithic cores. Brandon's prominence in the gunflint industry began in 1790 when a local resident won a contract to supply "100,000 flints of the best sort" to the Tower of London Arsenal. During the Napoleonic Wars (1789-1815), Brandon knappers had the exclusive contract to supply the British Army with gunflints. At its peak, the industry employed up to 200 flintknappers and exported 1.5 million flints per month.

8.0 Analysis and Conclusions

The 1862 Walling map depicts the home of J. McAvoy just to the west of the study area (Map 6). The land registry records show that the Crown patent was granted to John McAvoy in 1855. The family owned the property for only 12 years before selling it to James Anderson in 1867. Census records from 1861, which would have been taken around the same time as the data for the Walling map, list 12 people in the McAvoy household living in a one-story log cabin, presumably the structure depicted on the map.

The Stage 3 assessment of the J. McAvoy Site (BfFv-21) produced an assemblage of material typical of a mid-19th century Euro-Canadian farmstead. The time period suggested by the artifact assemblage coincides with the ownership of the property by the McAvoy family. The quantity of domestic refuse recovered at the site suggests that a residence, rather than an outbuilding, was present within or near the study area, although no structural features were located during the assessment. The sale of the property in 1867 to their neighbour James Anderson, and the lack of later 19th century artifacts, could suggest that the Anderson family was extending their farmland but continued to live on the adjacent lot, and not within the vicinity of the study area.

Chronological evidence based on material culture demonstrates that the occupation at the site spans primarily the mid 19th century. The presence of a much larger proportion of RWE (n=1,523) in comparison to VWE (n=4) is suggestive of a mid-19th century occupation, as the increase in popularity of vitrified white earthenware occurred over the latter half of the 19th century (Miller 1991). Likewise, the low frequency of pearlware (n=18) and the near absence of creamware (n=1) preclude an earlier 19th century date.

Slightly earlier ceramics such as sponged (n=89), edged (n=86), flawn transfer print (n=6), early palette paint (n=4), and canary glaze (n=2), are indicative of an occupation beginning sometime around the mid-19th century. They are frequent enough that they likely relate to an early period of occupation, rather than merely the presence of heirloom vessels. There is very limited evidence to suggest any intensive occupation of the site after the turn of the 20th century; it appears to have reverted entirely to agricultural use by that time.

Artifact types and functional categories as a percentage of totals from any unit are evenly distributed across the site area, exhibiting no patterning other than the concentration into the main site area. The features identified during the BSI investigation were both animal burials, and were fully excavated following Stage 4 methodology. There were no midden areas identified. e.g., no highly organic deposits, rich in artifacts and domestic kitchen waste such as faunal material. Additionally, there were no structures identified during the Stage 3 investigation.

The archaeological evidence uncovered represents an occupation of the site around the mid 19th century. This correlates with the documentary evidence of the property being occupied by the McAvoy family from at least 1855 until at least 1867. Therefore, the site has Cultural Historic Value or Interest (CHVI) under Section 3.4.2, Standards 1. a. and b., as most (80% or more) of the archaeologically documented occupation of the property predates 1870 (MCM 2011). Other criteria outlined in Table 3.2 of the Standards and Guidelines (MCM 2011) are relevant to the J. McAvoy site, namely the integrity of the site and the representation of the first generation of settlement.

In discussion with the property owner, it was determined that the J. McAvoy Site (BfFv-21) cannot be avoided based on the current development plan for turning the property into an

aggregate pit and therefore is not considered for long term protection and avoidance at this time as per Section 4.1.4 (MCM 2011). Accordingly, partial clearance and mitigation via Stage 4 excavation is recommended for the J. McAvoy Site (BfFv-21). Given the presence of subsurface features in the core, yet non-complex stratigraphy elsewhere, a combination of hand excavation followed by mechanical topsoil removal is recommended.

9.0 Recommendations

The J. McAvoy Site (BfFv-21) is considered culturally significant due to the overall integrity of the site as all archaeological contexts to subsoil are intact with no modern disturbances noted across the site.

In discussion with the licensee and property owner, it was determined that the J. McAvoy Site (BfFv-21) can be avoided and protected within the current development plan and is therefore recommended for Stage 4 Mitigation of Development Impact through long term protection and avoidance as per Section 4.1.4 (MCM 2011).

The J. McAvoy Site (BfFv-21) site will be avoided and protected during planned aggregate activities and long-term through the formal Site Plan under the ARA (SD Map 2). The following recommendations are made based on Stage 1 background research, Stage 2 test pit survey, Stage 3 test excavations:

1. The J. McAvoy Site (BfFv-21) archaeological site (Map 1, SD Map 1) is recommended to be of further CHVI and will be subject to long term protection and avoidance through the formal Site Plan registration under the ARA (SD Map 2).
2. The J. McAvoy Site (BfFv-21) and a 10-metre protective buffer zone shall be formally included as a protected area on the Site Plan under the ARA to prevent future encroachment (SD Map 2).
3. Routine agricultural use of the land may continue at existing levels, including the same practices and crop types, with the following restrictions:
 - a. No new drainage tiles, deep ploughing, or other invasive improvements.
 - b. No tree planting or crops requiring deep-rooted systems.
 - c. No irrigation systems requiring trenching or excavation.
4. The ARA Site Plan must explicitly prohibit all other disturbance to the J. McAvoy Site and the buffer, including:
 - a. No stockpiling of overburden.
 - b. No heavy equipment operation.
 - c. No ground disturbance including but not limited to landscaping, planting, grading, or soil stripping.
5. To ensure that the J. McAvoy Site (BfFv-21) is protected and not altered, the following shall be implemented:
 - a. Prior to grading or other soil-disturbing activities extending to the limits of the protected area, excluding routine agricultural use, erect a barrier (i.e., fence) around the 10 m protective buffer zone.
 - b. Issue “no-go” instructions to all on-site construction crews, engineers, architects, or others involved in day-to-day decisions during construction.
 - c. Show the location of the area to be avoided on all Site Plans, when applicable. Include explicit instructions or labelling to avoid that area.
 - d. A letter is provided by the proponent stating they are aware of the presence of the archaeological site within the limits of the ARA licence and that they are aware of the restrictions on alteration of an archaeological site of further CHVI as per the condition on their ARA licence as per Section 48 of the Ontario Heritage Act.
 - e. The protected archaeological site and its associated 10-metre buffer shall be clearly identified and incorporated into the final rehabilitation section of the Site Plan under the ARA. The rehabilitation plan must designate the archaeological site as excluded from any future disturbance or land alteration and ensure its long-term protection in accordance with its status as a site of further CHVI.

6. A licensed archaeologist must be present to monitor grading or other soil-disturbing activities extending to the limits of the protective buffer to ensure the J. McAvoy Site (BfFv-21) and its protective area are not altered in any way. Routine agricultural operations within permitted use parameters do not require archaeological monitoring.
7. Despite the rigorous nature of archaeological assessments, there remains a possibility that some cultural material may not have been identified. If any artifacts of Indigenous interest or human remains are encountered anywhere within the subject property, including the J. McAvoy Site (BfFv-21) and its protective buffer, all work must cease immediately, and the appropriate authorities must be contacted including:

10.0 Advice on Compliance with Legislation

- a. This report is submitted to the *Minister of Citizenship and Multiculturalism* as a condition of licencing in accordance with Part VI of the *Ontario Heritage Act*, R.S.O. 1990, c 0.18. The report is reviewed to ensure that it complies with the standards and guidelines that are issued by the Minister, and that the archaeological fieldwork and report recommendations ensure the conservation, protection and preservation of the cultural heritage of Ontario. When all matters relating to archaeological sites within the project area of a development proposal have been addressed to the satisfaction of the Ministry of Citizenship and Multiculturalism, a letter will be issued by the ministry stating that there are no further concerns with regard to alterations to archaeological sites by the proposed development.
- b. It is an offence under Sections 48 and 69 of the *Ontario Heritage Act* for any party other than a licenced archaeologist to make any alteration to a known archaeological site or to remove any artifact or other physical evidence of past human use or activity from the site, until such time as a licensed archaeologist has completed archaeological fieldwork on the site, submitted a report to the Minister stating that the site has no further cultural heritage value or interest , and the report has been filed in the Ontario Public Register of Archaeology Reports referred to in Section 65.1 of the *Ontario Heritage Act*.
- c. Should previously undocumented archaeological resources be discovered, they may be a new archaeological site and therefore subject to Section 48 (1) of the *Ontario Heritage Act*. The proponent or person discovering the archaeological resources must cease alteration of the site immediately and engage a licenced consultant archaeologist to carry out archaeological fieldwork, in compliance with Section 48 (1) of the *Ontario Heritage Act*.
- d. The *Cemeteries Act*, R.S.O. 1990 c. C.4 and the *Funeral, Burial and Cremation Services Act*, 2002, S.O. 2002, c.33 (when proclaimed in force) require that any person discovering human remains must notify the police or coroner and the Registrar of Cemeteries at the Ministry of Consumer Services.

Archaeological sites recommended for further archaeological fieldwork or protection remain subject to Section 48 (1) of the Ontario Heritage Act and may not be altered, or have artifacts removed from them, except by a person holding an archaeological licence.
